Origins of the Net

- U.S. Department of Defence needed secure communication in the Cold War
- Decentralized computer network
- No one computer could be targeted


When did it Start?


- UCLA "around Labor Day"
- □ 1 September 1969
- □ Took off in 1994


How Big is the 'Net'

- Started with FOUR computers
- ☐ Grew at 10% per month
- □ Now growing about 20% per month
- □ 2.1 billion pages in July 2000









What does the 'Net' provide?

- World Wide Web
- eMail
- News Groups
- Chat

World Wide Web

- Web Pages are grouped to make Web Sites
- Search engines are used to find data

Web Search Engines

- Free to the user
 - Paid for by advertising
- □ An Index of 'all' the sites
 - Web-crawlers find the sites

eMail

- The electronic equivalent to a letter
- Better than a fax
 - You can edit the original in your reply
- You can send attachments
 - □ e.g. Programs & Documents

News Groups

- □ Forums for open discussion
- Anyone can post messages
- □ The history of the discussion can be seen

Chat

- □ 'Talk' to others on-line
- □ Different rooms have different personalities

- Alignment
- □ Colour
- Uniformity
- □ Size (or resolution)
- Graphics
- Links

Email

- Jokes don't always translate
 - □ use :-) (smilies)
- □ DON'T USE ALL CAPS,
 - this is the online equivalent of shouting

Netiquette

- The person on the other side is a human being
- Be brief.
- Messages reflect on YOU—be proud of them
- Use descriptive Subject headings
- Think about your audience

Netiquette

- Be careful with humour and sarcasm
- Summarise what you are following up
- □ Give back to the Community
- □ Likewise, be a "giver" as well as a "taker"
- Try not to repeat what has already been said
- Cite appropriate references

Chatiquette

- Play by the rules
- Don't hog the conversation
- Don't ignore people
- Learn the lingo
