

## THE RESEARCH LODGE.

It is now nine years since the first meeting for those interested in furthering Masonic study in this district was called resulting in the creation of the Hawke's Bay Research Lodge. It was felt at that time that there was a definite sphere of work for such a Lodge, and a place for the contribution that it could make to the Masonic well-being of the district. The Hawke's Bay Research Lodge was consecrated at Hastings on August 1, 1933, and since that time many useful and notable lectures have been contributed. Many of these have been circulated to the members and have been appreciated throughout the district. To assist in the project every Lodge in the Hawke's Bay District became an Associate Member. Some of these have benefited by receiving visits from the Research Lodge, and some have made use of lectures that have been circulated to read in the Lodge on occasions when there was no ceremonial work. More assistance could probably be given to Lodges that may be short of work by arranging suitable speakers from the Research Lodge to pay them a visit and deliver an address. The W.M. or the Secretary of the Research Lodge would gladly arrange such assistance, where possible, whenever any Lodge requested it.

Another means of service to the Lodges in Hawke's Bay provided by the Research Lodge is the provision of a library of Masonic books, first for the use of members and associates of the Research Lodge, and also for the benefit of every member of every Lodge in this District who desires to take advantage of it. A Brother of any Lodge desiring the use of a book should make application for it through the Secretary of his Lodge, and if he lives away from Hastings postage may be included with the application, and it is expected that these books will be returned within a reasonable time.
